

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

On March 21st our elected church leaders and I met in our church office for an important exploratory conversation with our Genesee Valley District Superintendent, Rev. Vonda Fossitt. I had told Rev. Fossitt of my desire to retire from pastoral ministry on June 30, 2017 and for Mary Lou and me to continue making LeRoy UMC

our church home. That meant that LUMC would be without a pastor on July 1st. She worked and prayed with us to explore options for the future of LUMC. Together we sought to answer the question, "Where do we go from here?"

For clarification, I want you to know that the next paragraphs are taken from my personal notes of that meeting and have not yet been formally approved by the other persons in attendance. However, the group granted me permission to publish my comments for the benefit and purpose of keeping the whole congregation informed. So here goes. I hope you are as enthusiastic as we are about the possibilities.

From humble beginnings almost 200 years ago, LUMC became a compelling Christian influence on the values and attitudes of the LeRoy community. It grew as the community grew. For many years LUMC's imposing architecture with tall steeples was a testament to God's love and glory! An awe-inspiring Este pipe organ accompanied hundreds of Christian believers singing the praises of God. Today, it is no longer as we once knew it. It shrank as the community shrank. To the surprise of visitors and casual observers, LUMC appears to be approaching its end years.

Business and industry leaders, as well as other churches and service organizations in our community, know a thing or two about endings. Jell-O Foods, LeRoy Plow Manufacturing, United Steel, Elm Dairy and Lapp Insulator Manufacturing once dominated this local and regional economy. They were wealth generators and large contributors to our local churches and service organizations. However, with the passing of time most of them have become displays in the museum across the street or have withered to mere shadows of their former glory.

While we accept that these same economic, political and cultural/social changes are also impacting LUMC, we intend to acknowledge them, understand their implications on the Christian life, and assess our ministry challenges and opportunities in light of them. We are prepared to risking everything we have, if need be, in order to ensure that our ministry efforts are relevant and productive in this community.

We fully intend to enjoy now what is apparently being lost. At the same time, intend to create an environment in which Jesus Christ can be more effectively represented in this community. Can we do it? Our history says we can. Our faith, our hearts, and our daring spirits say, "With God's help, we can accomplish what seems impossible—the revitalization of LeRoy UMC.

Our methods? To model the life of Christ in and through us. Disciple making; recruiting and training people in the knowledge and love of God through Jesus Christ. Committed Christian living, for our joy and God's glory. We are on the path to heaven and we are inviting as many as possible to come with us. This isn't a pipe dream.

We have a solid foundation on which to build. This church is within earshot of celebrating two centuries of representing Jesus Christ in daily life. Two hundred years of successfully adapting to countless trends and innovations encourage us. Our methods of prayer, worship, education and witness in the work of Christ served us well in the past. We must now adapt them to the social, political, and spiritual circumstances of our day. We are encouraged by the knowledge that God can work wonders "under the circumstances" of any day. And "under *these* circumstances" we are

expecting to see the wonders of God.

Years from now, I predict we'll look back on this critical time of decision-making as fondly as old timers recall riding to LUMC in their horse-drawn buggies, setting up chairs to accommodate overflow crowds for worship services, hosting the Western New York Annual Conference, and praying that the Lord would bless their efforts in ministry. The Lord answered those prayers in ways we consider miraculous! If we commit ourselves to praying as passionately and boldly as our predecessors, surely the Lord will respond to us as well.

Good news! Fire melts ice. When invited, God's Holy Spirit takes the chill off our hearts and lights a fire within us. Let's seek the inspiration and guidance of God in this matter. From now until July 1, 2017, let's be in prayer together about all this. We will soon set a day and time to meet once a week for group prayer. The only point of prayer focus will be "the future of this church." It won't be a Bible study. It will be prayer meeting. And when our hearts are clear, we'll praise God and go back home.

Fortunes were made here in LeRoy. It was boom, decline, bust and eventually shuttered windows. There are already too many faded examples of grandeur in LeRoy. This church doesn't need or want to be another one.

Thank God -- Praise God – Trust God—And get ready to be blessed!
